#### The Women's Caucus Program in Dallas and Other Matters

Last year in Miami, I met many men and women who were unaware of the "Conference within a Conference" on the first Friday of the N.A.E.A. Convention. Many of them would have come before Saturday if the content and schedule of the Affiliate programs (I.N.S.E.A., Minority Concerns, Seminar for Research in Art Education, Social Theory Caucus and the Women's Caucus) had been better publicized. One of the consequences of this lack of awareness is the present situation in which Affiliate presentations are attended mainly by Affiliate members — many of whom are already in sympathy with the views expressed by their colleagues.

Those who attend the Convention each year may also feel that the activities of these special groups are only of interest to those directly involved. There are some male art educators, for example, who have not joined the Women's Caucus because it is not their problem. I think it was James Baldwin who said that the 'Black Problem' is a problem for whites as well as blacks. Most of the areas of interest within the N.A.E.A., whether they are classified with the Affiliates or the Divisions, ultimately affect us all. These "other areas" that normally don't get our attention, have the potential to contribute to our growth and development as educators. And there is also the potential contribution that we may make to them.

Length of Articles: Articles should not be longer than two or three pages of doublespaced type. Authors should edit longer papers to this length *before* submitting them to the editor. The editor reserves the right to edit, summarize, and/or print only excerpts as space permits. The Women's Caucus and the other Affiliates are trying to address this problem. The first day of the 1985 Women's Caucus presentations is divided evenly between men and women. It features several individuals who have not presented before under the aegis of the Caucus. There will also be a new format this year. Part I on Friday, April 19, will be devoted to sessions (with one exception) relating to the topic "A Question of Gender? — Style in Art Education." Then from 7:30 to9:00 that evening, all the presenters, participants and members of the audience will attempt to draw some conclusions.

And finally, we are actively incorporating greater opportunities for informal participation in our program. "The Method of Teaching Art Methods" will be an open forum in which participants can exchange ideas.

College teachers are asked to bring at least twenty copies of their "Methods of Teaching Art" course outlines to this session. From 9:00 to 11:00 P.M. we will hold our second annual Interaffiliate Dialogue with the addition of a Variety Show component. As we investigate our common denominators, we can drink, laugh and socialize. Any interested individuals in the N.A.E.A. and the members of the Affiliate groups are invited to submit a proposal for a 15 minute segment which may take the form of a panel, comedy skit, slide show, performance/happening, etc. Please send your outline as soon as possible to:



#### Call for Nominations for President-Elect



The Handbook for Achieving Sex Equity Through Education, edited by Susan S. Klein, will be available through the Johns Hopkins University Press in January. The Handbook addresses virtually all important sex equity issues, ranging from the need for institutional change in the visual arts curriculum to the kinds of programs required to meet the special needs of minority, gifted, rural and adult women. The authors of each chapter have addressed the same basic questions about how sex equity activities in their area can decrease sex stereotyping in general for females and males, can contibute to attitudinal. motivational, perceptual or behavioral changes and can affect other educationally significant outcomes that are important to parents, educators and parents.
